## Almost 94 Years (and counting) of The Buzzer

If you've ridden public transit in Vancouver anytime in the past nine decades, then you've seen *The Buzzer*. Named for the signal telling the

operator you wanted to disembark. The Buzzer has been the pamphletsized newsletter published by Vancouver public transit agencies since 1916. Developed

by George Kidd, the general manager of the B.C. Electric Railway Company, *The Buzzer* was meant to keep people informed about public transit. It was also intended to foster rider loyalty to B.C. Electric streetcars in the face of competition by 'jitney' operators (private citizens who patrolled streetcar routes and offered rides for five cents). The first issue was published on June 2, 1916. And

though jitney service was abolished in July 1918, *The Buzzer* became a mainstay of Vancouver's public transit system, no matter how much transit itself changed.

The Buzzer is a unique window into the past. Each issue speaks to everyday people about what affects them in the moment. Recognizing the need for levity in dark times, a bold headline in a February 1917 issue announced, "Latest War News," and then added in much smaller print, "will be found in the daily papers; The Buzzer is reserved for talk about the weather." And respecting the solemnity of the occasion, a January 1936 issue was dedicated to the passing of George V only a few days earlier.

For anyone interested in transit history in Vancouver, *The Buzzer* is the tallysheet of change!

For example, the May 18, 1951 issue reminded folks the conversion of Dunbar-West Broadway to trolley coach service would begin the following Monday. The conversion cost more than a million-and-a-quarter dollars, including 35 new trolley coaches at \$25,000 per vehicle, approximately 5.3 miles of two-way trolley coach overhead and poles, plus special loops and other enhancements. The Buzzer even had a long running

series of cartoons between 1954 and 1976, drawn by the late Bob Banks.

Jhenifer Pabilano will speak on the long history of *The Buzzer*, probably North America's longestpublished transit newsletter. She will also highlight the many wonderful



historical tidbits that *The Buzzer* has published, mirroring the history of Vancouver.

Jhenifer began writing and designing *The Buzzer* in January 2008, and as of March 2009 became more the editorin-chief, working with colleague Jennifer Despins to put the publication together. She is the main blogger on the Buzzer Blog (www.buzzer. translink.ca).

## **Luncheon a Great Success**

A very well attended VHS Annual Incorporation Day Luncheon took place on Sunday April 4th at the University Golf Club. Representing the City of Vancouver, acting Mayor, COPE Councillor David Cadman expressed his appreciation for the historical interest and work that the Society is doing. Also represented were the Archive's Les Mobbs, and the Museum of Vancouver's Joan Seidl. Performing his annual traditional role, former VHS president Len McCann rang the bell of the *Robert Kerr*, the same bell which had rung furiously during the fire of 1886 guiding people through the smoke to the refuge of the vessel in the harbour.

The featured speaker was historian Daniel Francis, author of more than two dozen books as well as the *Encyclopedia of British Columbia*. He captivated the audience with his observations and insights into the career of

L.D. Taylor, from his book *Mayor Louis Taylor and the Rise of Vancouver: LD.* Landing in Vancouver in 1896 Taylor

was fleeing a financial scandal in Chicago. After putting down roots here, he became the most elected mayor in the city, serving seven times between 1910 and

1934. A journalist and entrepreneur, L. D. was responsible for building the not immodest Sun Tower and promoting public

works such as the airport at Sea Island. Known as the friend of labour, he paradoxically opposed labour militancy and left-wing movements. After an investigation by police of wrong doing, of which L. D. was cleared, his reputation was tarnished and he was soundly defeated by Gerry McGeer in the election of 1934, and although he sought public office several times after that was never again elected.

Much to speaker Daniel Francis' surprise and delight, he was awarded the Society's Award of Merit for 2010 "for his significant contributions to the history of Vancouver and British Columbia through his prolific writing both in print and on the internet." Also receiving a second 2010 Award of Merit was the VHS's own Larry Wong "for his considerable efforts to instill a wider appreciate of the contributions of Canadians of Chinese ancestry to Vancouver, British Columbia and Canada."

## Women on Ice

## Last Month's Speaker: Wayne Norton

Wayne Norton's April 22nd talk on Women's Hockey drew in several enthusiastic descendants of the Vancouver Ladv's Hockey Club. As well, VHS member Leslie Clauson brought along a photograph (see insert) of a relative, a

uniformed Betty Hinds, who was part of the Vancouver Lady's Hockey Club as well as the Vancouver Amazons. For Leslie, this was a "eureka" moment for she was able — through Wayne's illustrated lecture — to place the date of the photograph and Betty's role in the decades of the rise and fall of Women's Hockey in Vancouver and British Columbia. 
For those of us not directly connected to women's hockey it was a fascinating and entertaining evening. In the beginning of his research, which had been launched through a grant from the Vancouver Historical Society, Wayne had to scrounge around for a title and so pressed into service the wicked wit of Chuck Davis

who presented him with quite unusable titles like "Goals and Dolls", among others. At one point during the Power Point presentation all eyes were riveted on one particular player in a 1917 long dress uniform of the time and with a face that was identical to Wayne's causing Wayne to flatly deny that it was him in drag.

That the West End became a natural wellspring of talent for the then "unladylike" stick wielding team of the Amazons was a natural given that at that time, apartment buildings were being built specifically for the single West

> End women working downtown. As well as the giant Denman Arena was situated nearby. The Amazons triumph in 1918 over the more ladylike Vancouver Lady's Hockey Club was long lasting. With a constantly changing roster throughout the 1920s along with teams like the Fernie Swastikas, Victoria Kewpies, and Seattle Vamps, the Amazons went on to participate in Western Canadian Championships held at Banff.

> Women's hockey had disappeared by the late 1930s, skipping a generation only to re-emerge in the 1960s. However, the existence of early women's hockey is not high in the public's consciousness for Wayne noted that a recent TV commentator cheerfully pointed out the "pioneering" women hockey players of the 1980s. Such



commentators and others would do well to read Wayne's book, Women on Ice: The Early Years of Women's Hockey in Western Canada, Vancouver: Ronsdale Press, 2009.
